115.11	Zero tolerance of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; PREA coordinator
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The Lake Region Correctional Facility (LRCF) is operated by the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center. The LRCF's PREA Policy 606 follows the guidelines of the PREA standards. Throughout this report this will be referred to as the "PREA policy". The PREA policy mandates zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and outlines the agency's approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to such conduct.
	The jail is operated by a county board of commissioners who have seats to provide representation of all the counties that make up this multi-county regional jail. The day-to-day jail administration is managed by the Director. The Director works very closely with a Captain and the PREA Coordinator who is tasked with maintaining PREA Compliance. The PREA Coordinator reports directly to the captain and is a senior-level staff and directly oversees the jail's PREA efforts. The PREA Coordinator has the time and the authority to carry out her PREA-related duties. It is important to note that during this last cycle this jail experienced staffing shortages that required the PREA Coordinator work correctional officer shifts for a period of time. Although PREA-related activities did suffer during this period, they did continue, did not fall below

compliance requirements, and as soon as normal staffing levels resumed, the PREA
Coordinator assumed her normal duties and PREA related activities were resumed to
the high level and expectations that she has set for herself. Throughout the audit
process the staff were very responsive.

115.12	Contracting with other entities for the confinement of inmates
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF housed inmates in other counties during the past year. They did not have a formal contract with these facilities, but rather used their daily rates and used them on an as-needed basis. The counties that held inmates on behalf of the LRCF were the Burleigh Morton Detention Center, the Rolette County Jail, the Heart of America Correctional and Treatment Center, and the McKenzie County Correctional Facility. Each of these facilities complies with the PREA standards and their audits and annual reports are on their websites. However, according to the FAQ dated February 19, 2014, when an agency has discretion over which local confinement facility to place their inmates, and they provide financial compensation to the local facility, then the arrangement would be considered a contract under the standards.
	CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor requires contracts with any agency it places its inmates, and that contract must have a PREA clause to include that facility's obligation to adopt and comply with the PREA standards and a provision for LRCF contract monitoring to ensure that the contractor is complying with the PREA standards. LRCF inmates are not currently housed in any other facility and have not been since March 2023. Although it is not possible to go back and correct the failure to have a PREA clause for the previous year, the auditor requires a sample contract form that can be used in the future, prior to LRCF inmates being placed in another facility's jail. On September 22, 2023, the PREA Coordinator provided their sample contract that includes a PREA clause. This contract will be implemented in the future prior to housing any LRCF inmates in another facility.

115.13	Supervision and monitoring
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor interviewed the Chairman of the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center Governing Board, the Director, the Captain, and the PREA Coordinator. The auditor reviewed the LRCF PREA policy, verified the staffing levels through the schedule that was provided and verified through direct observation while on the facility tour. The

LRCF has one Captain, one Lieutenant, four Sergeants and 14 Corrections Officers. There are always, at a minimum, three direct care staff on duty 24 hours each day. Typically, during the weekday there is one (1) captain, one (1) lieutenant, one (1) sergeant and three (3) correctional officers on duty and on nights and weekends there is one (1) sergeant and three (3) correctional officers. The facility utilizes Policy 223 Staffing which outlines the requirements of a staffing plan. The auditor reviewed the last staffing plan that was completed in 2020. The Staffing Plan lists each post and the hours of each shift needed to cover that post. Although staffing levels are reviewed on a continuous basis, a formal staffing plan has not been completed nor has the staffing plan been adjusted as it should have been when the facility was downgraded by the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation due to deficiencies found in their annual inspection. In addition to an annual staffing plan review, when the facility was downgraded to a 96-hour hold facility and when the facility was returned to a grade one correctional facility but restricted at a limited capacity of 50 inmates instead of their designed facility capacity of 105 inmates, there should have been updated staffing plans to fit these new developments.

The ND DOCR found the LRCF non-compliant in three critical standards related to supervision. Standard 031 Suicide Observation, Standard 032 Inmate Observations, and Standard 033 Daily Written Record Requirements. The DOCR report stated that in relation to suicide prevention the mental health screening after removal from observation was not completed and that video documentation shows rounds were not being conducted as documented. The DOCR accepted the LRCF's corrective action plan and currently is monitoring the facility to ensure they are continuing to operate as required during the corrective action period. The agency recently added the Guardian rounds tracker system. This system requires the staff to perform rounds each hour and sounds an alarm when they are close to missing the next round within the time limits.

There are documented, unannounced rounds conducted by the Lieutenants in emails between the three Lieutenants when each one conducts their assigned round. However, the documentation should be more formal in a facility file rather than on the individual lieutenant's cell phones. The new Guardian rounds tracker system now records when the lieutenants make their unannounced rounds. The agency has a PREA policy that prohibits staff from alerting other staff members that these supervisory rounds are occurring, unless such announcement is related to the legitimate operational functions of the facility. There are multiple cameras throughout the facility that are monitored by dispatch, in the booking area and in the Lieutenants and PREA Coordinator's office.

CORRECTIVE ACTIONS: The auditor required an updated staffing plan based on current population levels. The auditor continued to follow the DOCR's monitoring period to ensure adequate rounds were completed and documented. The PREA Coordinator provided rounds documentation during the corrective action period. The PREA Coordinator provided an updated staffing plan reflecting the September meeting held with the Director, the reentry center's Operations Manager, the Captain and the PREA Coordinator. This staffing plan with an addendum reflects the DOCR's upgrade to their current level of an inmate capacity of 80.

115.14	Youthful inmates
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF does not house youthful inmates.

115.15	Limits to cross-gender viewing and searches
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF prohibits cross-gender searches of all inmates in the PREA policy and the Searches policy. The auditor verified through staff and inmate interviews and a review of the training curriculum that the practice and training of staff is to ask an inmate who identifies as transgender which gender of staff they would prefer to conduct their search. All certified corrections officers have been through the Correctional Officer Basic School in which cross-gender search training is taught. The facility uses hands-on training in-house and/or the PRC's "Guidance in Cross-Gender and Transgender Pat Searches" to train in the appropriate way to complete a cross-gender or transgender pat search. Staff were able to demonstrate the correct search techniques to the auditor. There are female staff available to conduct searches of female inmates and this was confirmed during staff and inmate interviews. The facility prohibits examination for the sole purpose of determining gender and staff are knowledgeable of correct search procedures for transgender or intersex inmates. If the offender's genital status is unknown, it is determined during conversations with the offender, by reviewing medical records, or, if necessary, by learning that information as part of a broader medical examination conducted in private by a medical practitioner. The facility does not conduct cross gender strip or pat down searches, but policy and training require that if this is to occur during an exigent circumstance to document it with justification.
	Policy and procedures require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering an inmate housing unit. The auditor witnessed this when in housing areas and it was confirmed through staff and inmate interviews.
	The facility has policies and procedures and physical construction of housing areas that enable offenders to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without nonmedical staff of the opposite gender viewing them in a state of undress. Shower areas are individual stalls with a shower curtain or a door. In cells that have cameras, the toilet area is digitally blacked out so they cannot be seen when viewed on the monitors. Both staff and inmates stated that announcements of opposite gendered staff are made consistently and that inmates have privacy to shower, dress and use the toilet.

115.16	Inmates with disabilities and inmates who are limited English proficient
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Policy 602 Inmates with Disabilities and Policy 503 Inmate Handbook and Orientation address the measures used by the LRCF to ensure inmates with disabilities, inmates who are limited English proficient, and inmates with limited reading skills have access to all aspects of the agency's prevention, detection, and response efforts. The LRCF Policy 602 Inmates With Disabilities includes a statement that inmates with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate in or benefit from all aspects of their efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The LRCF uses their Guardian devices equipped with Google translate for immediate translation needs and the Language Link for interpretive services for inmates who do not speak English or when a sign language interpreter is needed. All staff are instructed in the procedures for assisting inmates who may need additional assistance. Staff work with inmates who have either visual impairments or reading and comprehension issues by verbally reviewing the material. The agency prohibits the use of inmate interpreters, readers, or other types of inmate assistants except in limited circumstances where an extended delay in obtaining an effective interpreter could compromise the inmate's safety.

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115.17	Hiring and promotion decisions
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF Policy 305 Recruitment and Selection governs the hiring process and includes the components required by this PREA standard. Law enforcement background checks are run upon hire. They are also re-ran every five years. The LRCF ran background checks on all staff in 2020 and every new hire since that time. They will run all staff again in 2025 and continue this process every five years to ensure that background checks are always current. The LRCF asks the required questions within their hiring process regarding any previous sexual misconduct and documents this on a form that is signed and dated by each employee. This form also requires that the employee acknowledges understanding of the required continuing duty to report any adverse contact with law enforcement or sexual misconduct throughout the terms of their employment. These questions are asked again annually of each employee. The facility checks with all previous institutional employers specifically regarding substantiated allegations of sexual abuse and provided documented evidence to support this. The auditor verified these required documentation.

L15.18	Upgrades to facilities and technologies
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor reviewed the LRCF PREA policy, video monitoring systems, directly observed the facility and conducted interviews with the Chairman of the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center Governing Board, the Director, the Captain, and the PREA Coordinator. The facility considers protection of inmates and the standards when contemplating upgrades to the facility or in the application of technology. Recently the agency added a Guardian rounds tracker system to ensure hourly rounds are conducted and documented as required. Also, the facility has relocated their control room where camera monitoring equipment is located and its booking desk to better aid in inmate observation and better flow of the intake process. Best practice is to alleviate any area where an inmate can be in a one-on-one situation with another inmate or with a staff member. Cameras cover all areas. Most storerooms and utility rooms do not have cameras, but cameras cover the entrance to these locked rooms. Staff are aware that they are never to be in an area one-on-one with an inmate in areas without a camera. The camera systems are upgraded as needed throughout service.
	The inmate visual search at booking is completed by a single officer within the search room of the booking area. The auditor recommends that either another staff member or a camera is placed so that the staff conducting the visual search is either on camera or viewed by another staff member. Inmates in isolated one-on-one situations with staff, and especially when they are in a state of undress as they are during the visual search, are at risk. For the protection of both the inmate and the staff against false allegations, it is preferred that the searcher be in view by another staff member or a camera.

115.21	Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor reviewed the PREA policy and interviewed both the criminal and administrative investigators that conduct investigations. The auditor spoke with the director at Safe Alternatives for Abused Families (SAAF) who provides an advocate for accompaniment, victim support services, a sexual assault examination room and a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE). Inmates who have been sexually assaulted can be transported to SAAF where the SANE will conduct a forensic medical sexual assault examination. The LRCF has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with SAAF for these services. When law enforcement responds to a sexual assault case within the jail, evidence protocol is followed, and they work cooperatively with the SANE to ensure all usable physical evidence is gathered. The LRCF has an MOU with

the Devils Lake Police Department to provide investigations in accordance with PREA standards 115.21.

115.22	Policies to ensure referrals of allegations for investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The PREA policy requires the facility refer all allegations for investigation. The LRCF investigations are completed by qualified investigators and required documentation and reporting occurs. There are trained administrative investigators from the facility and criminal investigators from the Devil's Lake Police Department available to investigate allegations of sexual misconduct within the jail. The administrative investigators have completed the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's (NDDOCR) course PREA Investigator Training. Staff sexual misconduct may be investigated through an independent investigation conducted by the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigations if referred by the police department. The investigative policy is published on facility website at https://www.lrlec.org/LRCFreports.html.

115.31	Employee training
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor interviewed the PREA Coordinator, and staff and reviewed training documentation. Newly hired staff have orientation training which includes the required components of this PREA training standard. Staff sign an acknowledgement form that they understand the requirements of PREA, the facility's zero tolerance policy and that they must immediately report any information or knowledge of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. However, they were using their acknowledgement form that they also use for volunteers and contractors. The training documentation forms should be relevant to the material that they cover. New hires participate in training through the National Institute of Corrections (NIC) video PREA: Your Role Responding to Sexual Abuse, a review of the agency PREA policies, and some basic in-person training provided to them by the PREA Coordinator. For refresher training by existing employees they provide in-service training and policy review through various methods such as NIC, Lexipol, LocalGov, the Justice Clearinghouse, and presentations taught by the PREA Coordinator. Staff were knowledgeable in the required competencies such as the correct first responder response – separate, provide care, protect evidence, call for assistance, notify the supervisor and provide a written report. However, the training documentation pulled in the random sample was very

spotty and what is documented, is recorded in numerous different ways.

CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required more consistent and formalized methods of documenting the training. The training for staff should state which curriculum they used in completing the training and have a statement of understanding. The auditor required any training completed during the corrective action period to be completed using any newly developed documentation forms. The auditor required any missing documentation from newly hired personnel as well as any new hire documentation for those staff hired during the corrective action period. The PREA Coordinator provided new-hire and employee PREA training completed during the corrective action period.

115.32	Volunteer and contractor training
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF trains all volunteers and contractors at the level of their interaction with inmates. Training was verified through the interview process with staff and contractors, and through review of training records with signature sheets. Contractors and volunteers were instructed how to report if an inmate reported sexual assault or harassment. There typically are no unescorted contractors allowed in inmate areas. The food service is delivered by a local restaurant and they have absolutely no contact with inmates. A correctional officer brings the prepared food into the kitchen and the inmates prepare the food trays to be delivered to the housing units by the correctional officers.

115.33	Inmate education
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF provides basic information to an inmate during the intake process about the jail's zero tolerance policy and how to report. The information is presented to the inmate during the booking process by going over key components of the handbook information and then requiring the inmate to sign. Although the reporting information is in the handbook, the list of key components form that the inmate signs is missing how to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The handbook is available electronically on the kiosk or in paper form. The jail staff review this information orally with inmates with low literacy or comprehension levels or other disabilities or issues that may prevent them from learning this information on their own. For more in-depth information inmates are required to watch the video "What You Need to Know" during

the first log on to the kiosk. This was verified through inmate interviews, by logging on to the kiosk while in a housing unit and by a printout of inmates who have completed this process. PREA information is readily available throughout the inmate's stay on posters, on inmate texter handheld devices, on the kiosk in the housing area, and on TV monitors that scrolls though various information to include basic PREA information. The auditor verified compliance with this standard through staff and inmate interviews and by reviewing a sample of the initial and secondary, more comprehensive training for inmates.

CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required the reporting information be added to the initial basic PREA information documentation. The LRCF immediately corrected this while the auditor was on-site and on June 26, 2023, sent a sample of the newly implemented form signed by inmates up to that date.

115.34	Specialized training: Investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF has trained facility investigators to conduct administrative investigations. The administrative investigator has completed the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's (NDDOCR) course PREA Investigator Training. All criminal allegations are turned over to the Devils Lake Police Department for investigation. The investigator through the police department has extensive law enforcement experience and has completed various training specific to sexual assault investigations. He continuously refreshes his training by attending training on sexual abuse investigations such as the one he is enrolled in for next month. He works with others to form a coordinated response effort to include the SANE nurse and the advocates from Safe Alternatives for Abused Families (SAAF). Specialized training included techniques for interviewing sexual abuse victims, proper use of Miranda and Garrity warnings, sexual abuse evidence collection in confinement settings, and the criteria and evidence required to substantiate a case for administrative action or prosecution referral. The department may refer allegations of staff criminal sexual misconduct to the North Dakota Bureau of Investigations.

115.35	Specialized training: Medical and mental health care
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor interviewed the nurse and the case manager. The nurse was recently hired on a part-time basis but will be going full time at the end of June. Both the nurse

and the case manager were made aware by the PREA Coordinator that they need to complete specialized training through the National Institute of Corrections "PREA 201 For Medical and Mental Health Practitioners" by the end of the month. The previous nurse had the required specialized training.

They do not conduct forensic exams at this facility. As indicated through the interviews, they are knowledgeable in how to detect and assess signs of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; how to preserve physical evidence of sexual abuse; how to respond effectively and professionally to victims of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; and how and to whom to report allegations or suspicions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. All inmates who would report a sexual assault and need a forensic medical examination are transported to the local rape crisis center, SAAF, who has SANE services. Medical staff verbally inform inmates that they must report any incidents of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that occurred within a facility. They would obtain informed consent prior to reporting incident about prior sexual victimization that did not occur in an institutional setting.

CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required that the nurse and the case manager complete the NIC specialized training for health care providers and provide the documentation to the auditor. On June 27, 2023, the PREA Coordinator provided the requested training documentation.

115.41	Screening for risk of victimization and abusiveness
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor spoke with the PREA Coordinator, staff and inmates, reviewed Policy 507 Inmate Classification, and reviewed inmate screening documents. The LRCF completes a screening process upon intake. The screening has all the required components as stated in the standards. Staff confirmed that they are continually reassessing an inmate's status. The PREA Coordinator completes a reassessment screening for inmates within 30 days of intake. This is required to ensure a reassessment is done based on any additional, relevant information received by the facility since the initial intake screening. Inmates who are transgender or intersex are reassessed at least twice each year. Inmates are also reassessed if referred, requested by a staff member, there is an incident of sexual abuse or there is receipt of any other information that increases the inmate's risk of sexual victimization or abusiveness.

115.42	Use of screening information
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

The LRCF screening process is used along with other classification methods to determine placement within their housing areas. There are enough housing options to keep inmates separate if the screening indicated this was necessary. All inmates shower separately from other offenders. The jail considers the concerns of a transgendered or intersex inmate's own view with respect to his or her own safety. Those views are given serious consideration, and this was demonstrated through the interviews of staff and residents. The facility does not place lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex inmates in particular housing, bed or other assignments solely on the basis of such identification or status, nor does the facility consider lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex identification or status as an indicator of likelihood of being sexually abusive.

115.43	Protective Custody
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF will make every effort to keep victims in their normal housing unit. They are only assigned involuntary segregated housing until an alternative means of separation from likely abusers can be arranged. They have adequate housing options to affect separation and focus on removing the suspected abuser rather than the victim.

115.51	Inmate reporting
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The auditor interviewed administrators, staff, and inmates, reviewed the policy and the inmate handbook, reviewed information on the kiosk and on the in-house closed circuit TV system, and toured the facility. The LRCF provides multiple external ways for inmates to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Inmates can call externally to family and friends, and call or write to the Devils Lake Police Department. The auditor made a test call from an inmate phone to the Devils Lake Police Department Police Department to confirm that the call did not require an inmate Personal Identification Number (PIN) and that it was a free call. The dispatcher confirmed that they would accept the call and immediately forward inmate reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment to agency officials, allowing the inmate to remain anonymous upon request.
	The LRCF provides multiple internal ways for inmates to privately report sexual abuse

and sexual harassment, retaliation by other offenders or staff for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to such incidents. They can report verbally to staff, send a request from the kiosk, from the texter, write a grievance, put in a sick call slip and report to medical staff or the case manager. They also can speak with the Administrator, the Captain, any Lieutenant or the PREA Coordinator by making a request at any time. Staff accept reports made verbally, in writing, anonymously, and from third parties and promptly document any verbal reports. Staff can privately report to any staff within their chain of command or outside of the chain of command to any administrator.

115.52	Exhaustion of administrative remedies
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The LRCF formal administrative procedures are in policy 609 – Inmate Grievances. Section 609.6 addresses inmate grievances regarding sexual abuse. Inmates are encouraged to report at any time. There are no set time frames for reporting sexual abuse and an inmate may report at any time, to any person via multiple ways. Inmates are encouraged to report directly to staff members, but that if they do not feel comfortable in doing this they may report to SAAF, the local abuse advocacy center in Devils Lake. An inmate does not have to exhaust one method of reporting before being allowed to employ another method to obtain action.

115.53	Inmate access to outside confidential support services
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Inmates have access to outside confidential support services. The facility has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Safe Alternatives for Abused Families (SAAF) in Devils Lake for advocacy and victim support services. Both the nurse and the case manager stated that they would also make recommendations for inmates to speak with a mental health professional at the Lake Region Human Services Center and make referrals for any follow-up services needed.

The LRCF website provides information on how an individual can make a third-party report. Third parties can report sexual abuse and sexual harassment to the Director or the PREA Coordinator, and the phone number and address is provided on the website. Interviews with staff and inmates confirm that staff and inmates are aware that third-party reporting options are available. The LRCF provides inmates with reasonable and confidential access to their attorney. In addition, inmates interviewed reported that they had contact with their families and others regularly who could report on their behalf. The facility has Third Party Reporting information on their website at https://www.lrlec.org/LRCF%20SH%20Policy.html. This information is also provided publicly to on the closed-circuit TV monitor in the lobby of the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center.

All employees may privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates to their supervisor or any other facility supervisor. Random staff interviews confirmed their responsibility to report and to maintain that information in confidence. The PREA Coordinator, the Captain, administrator, or designee, will assign an investigator for all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, including third-party and anonymous reports. Staff interviews confirmed their responsibility to report and to maintain that information in consibility to report and anonymous reports.

	The auditor reviewed the PREA policy, interviewed the staff and the administration. The facility requires all staff to take immediate action to protect the inmate from imminent sexual abuse. All staff understand that "immediate" means when the response is needed – that could mean within minutes if the abuse were recent, or it could mean before the end of the shift for incidents in which an abuse was reported that occurred in the distant past. There have been no reported incidents over the past

12 months in which immediate protection measures were required because an inmate was subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse.

There are no instances of such allegations received regarding another facility or from another facility regarding an incident at this facility for the past 12 months.

The Jail Administrators and the PREA Coordinator are notified, the coordinated response is initiated with the individual being taken to the hospital or SAAF as appropriate. An advocate is provided, and the investigator is notified so that they may report to the hospital, and/ or, to SAAF or to the facility to begin the investigative process.

	The LRCF coordinated response plan is defined within their PREA policy and their Sexual Assault Coordinated Community Response document. coordinate responses within the facility and with the SANE and advocate. The jail

Measures include housing changes, removing contact of alleged staff/inmate abusers and emotional support services for those who fear retaliation. Interviews with the PREA Coordinator confirmed her duties and responsibilities. These steps are properly documented in the PREA policy. The LRCF will document monitoring efforts. In the event of an incident, the PREA Coordinator's monitoring efforts includes periodic status checks with the victim and/or anyone who suspects retaliation for reporting or cooperating with an investigation.

victim. There were no inmates who allege to have suffered from sexual abuse that
were assigned to involuntary segregated housing over this past reporting period

	The auditor interviewed upper-level staff and the investigators. The auditor reviewed investigative files. Through the interview with both an administrative and the criminal investigator it was determined that investigations are not terminated should the source of the allegation recant. Should criminal prosecution be considered, the investigator coordinates with the state's attorney. Polygraph tests are not used during their investigations. The credibility of those interviewed by investigators is believed to be true until corroborating facts tell otherwise and is not made on the basis of that individual's status as an inmate or staff. All written reports are retained for as long as the alleged abuser is incarcerated or employed by the facility plus five years. Investigations will not be terminated due to the departure of an alleged abuser or victim. These steps are properly documented in the PREA policy. The investigators have completed specialized training. The investigations include efforts to determine whether staff actions/failures contributed to the abuse documented through written reports, which will include physical/testimonial evidence, credibility assessments and investigative facts and findings.

	The investigator was knowledgeable as to the standard for administrative investigations. They are fully aware that the facility uses no standard higher than the preponderance of evidence in making final determinations of sexual abuse/ harassment – meaning that the facility can take necessary actions when at the conclusion of the investigation the evidence leads them to believe the incident more than likely occurred (greater than 50%).

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

The auditor interviewed staff, the investigators and reviewed investigative files. The PREA Coordinator uses a form to report the outcome to the inmate. If the allegation is against a staff member, the form includes information about if the staff is no longer posted in the inmate's unit and/or if the staff is no longer employed at the facility. The form also includes information regarding if the alleged abuser is indicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility or has been convicted of an offense related to the sexual abuse within the facility. The inmate signs the form to document receipt of this information. The outcome states whether the allegation has been determined to be substantiated, unsubstantiated, or unfounded. If the inmate refuses to sign the findings form or the inmate is no longer in custody at the facility, the PREA Coordinator will document this on the form. There was only one unfounded case involving three inmates that required the inmates to be notified and documentation of this was provided to the auditor.

	The auditor interviewed upper-level staff and reviewed PREA policy. Staff are subject to disciplinary sanctions up to and including termination for violating agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies. Termination is the presumptive disciplinary sanction for staff who have engaged in sexual abuse. Disciplinary sanctions for violations of agency policies relating to sexual abuse or sexual harassment (other than actually engaging in sexual abuse) are commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the acts committed, the staff member's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other staff with similar histories. All terminations for violations of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies, or resignations by staff who would have been terminated if not for their resignation, are reported to law enforcement, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, and reported to the North Dakota Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

	The auditor interviewed the Director and the PREA Coordinator, and reviewed the policy. Volunteers and contractors are subject to disciplinary actions including

According to the Director, should any violation of this type be substantiated, the
facility has complete authority to administer remedial measures including prohibiting
further contact with inmates. Contractors or volunteers who engage in sexual abuse
will be reported to law enforcement agencies (unless the activity was clearly not
criminal). These requirements are outlined in their policy. There have been no
allegations reported against contractors or volunteers during this reporting period.

The LRCF does not provide counseling or therapy to address and correct the underlying reasons or motivations for abuse. If findings of inmate-on inmate sexual abuse are substantiated, administrative sanctions will be administered following the formal disciplinary processes and applied commensurate with the level of infractions. Some examples given by the Director are loss of privileges such as, loss of commissary, use of texters, and other minor sanctions for minor infractions. More serious infractions would be segregation, transfer, and additional criminal charges.

	The auditor interviewed the upper-level staff, the nurse, and the case manager. The nurse sees the screening so that they may discuss with them any disclosure regarding previous sexual abuse to see if there is any support or medical services needed. This is documented on the nurse's screening form. The nurse and the case manager verbally informs about their limits to confidentiality. The auditor recommended that they post notices in their offices and/or have the inmates sign a limit to confidentiality form and provided samples to them. In North Dakota medical practitioners are required to report sexual abuse to law enforcement under N.D.C.C. 43-17.41 and N.D.C.C. 43.12.1 if they perform any diagnosis or treatment for any individual suffering from any wound, injury, or other physical trauma that was inflicted in violation of any criminal law of the state. The report must state the name of the injured individual's physical injury is the result of a sexual offense, as

defined in chapter 12.1-20, in which case the individual's name, address, and any identifying information may not be included in the report without the individual's written release.

CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required the nurse to provide copies of their notice of limits to confidentiality and written release of information for reporting sexual abuse. On July 21, 2023, the PREA Coordinator provided the release of information form used by the nurse.

115.82 Access to emergency medical and mental health services

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

Emergency medical response was not needed during the review period. The PREA policy documents PREA requirements for access to emergency medical and mental health services. Emergency services would be provided by Mercy Hospital. The LRCF would coordinate with the Lake Region Human Services Center or the referring agency (BOP, NDDOCR) to provide mental health services. Treatment services are provided to the victim without financial cost regardless of whether the victim names the abuser or cooperates with the investigation. The procedures were verified both through review of policy and through conversations with staff, the nurse, and the case manager.

	The auditor interviewed upper-level staff, the nurse, and the case manager, and reviewed the PREA policy. The evaluation and treatment will include follow-up services, treatment plans, and, when necessary, referrals for continued care following their transfer to, or placement in, other facilities, or their release from custody. The LRCF provides such victims with medical and mental health services consistent with the community level of care. Offender victims of sexual abuse while incarcerated are offered tests for sexually transmitted infections and pregnancy as medically appropriate.

The auditor recommends that rather than a free-flow narrative report they use some type of incident review form so that all questions are asked during the review process – change in policy or practice, motivation, physical barriers, staffing levels and monitoring technology. The review team includes the Director, the PREA Coordinator, the investigator, upper-level administrative staff, the case manager, and medical staff when appropriate.

The Chairman and the Director stated the PREA Coordinator prepares the annual report and submits it to the administration for approval prior to publishing on the website. The auditor recommends that the report have a signature block for the Chairman and the Director as well. Although aggregate data is posted on the website for 2014 through 2022, the annual report does not have any comparative analysis statements.

CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required an updated annual report for 2022 be posted with a comparative analysis statement. On July 20, 2023, the auditor read the updated 2022 Annual Report posted on the LRCF website. This report contains a comparative analysis.

The PREA policy addresses data storage, publication, and destruction requirements. Data collected is retained via limited access and it is retained for at least ten (10) years. The auditor was able to review the aggregate data posted for the years 2014 to 2022. The LRCF does not make all aggregate sexual abuse data from the facilities with which it contracts for the housing of LRCF inmates available to the public through its website.
	CORRECTIVE ACTION: The auditor required the aggregate data (or links to the aggregate data) of all agencies that it has contracted with over the past year to be posted on the LRCF website.
